Oil Falls on Iran Deal Optimism, Yen Strengthens: Markets Wrap

Oil prices plummeted by as much as 7.3% after US President Donald Trump announced plans to call off a massive attack on Iran. This announcement sparked immediate optimism for fresh talks between the two countries starting from Monday. The negotiations aim to reach a deal that would reopen the Strait of Hormuz, a crucial waterway for oil exports. South Korean chipmakers were particularly affected by the decline in oil prices, which led to a fall in Asian stocks. Major OPEC+ nations, such as Saudi Arabia, are closely watching these developments alongside international markets. Bill Gates Held A Top Secret 'Q' Clearance For Seven Years - And The DOE Won't Say Why

Microsoft co-founder Bill Gates held a top-tier Q security clearance at the Department of Energy from 2014 to 2021. This clearance was not granted directly by the DOE but was reciprocally granted by another federal agency which has not been disclosed. Gates chairs TerraPower, an advanced nuclear reactor company, and had the clearance for seven years during President Obama's administration. The clearance persisted through the COVID-19 pandemic without public knowledge until now. The DOE letter confirming the clearance was entered into the Congressional record recently. This raises questions about why Gates was given access to highly classified information without disclosing it in his resume. The lack of transparency surrounding the agency that originally granted the clearance has sparked controversy. This is a matter of significance because it highlights the complexities of national security clearances. It also raises questions about why Gates, as a private citizen, was granted access to sensitive information without proper disclosure. The fact that he had a Q clearance while working on non-nuclear projects also sparks scrutiny. Potential for private interests to influence government decision-making is a key concern for observers. 'Defend Israel Or The Homeland': Top US General Issues Stark Warning To Pentagon Brass

General Alexis Grynkewich, the head of US European Command, has informed the Pentagon that he does not have enough naval units to protect Israel. This warning comes as tensions between the US and Iran escalate under President Donald Trump's administration. 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Gunman Targets Tesla Supercharger And In-N-Out In Twin Falls, Killing Two

A gunman opened fire at an In-N-Out Burger in Twin Falls, Idaho, killing two people and injuring five others. The suspect was also found dead, bringing an end to what authorities described as a very chaotic active shooter scene. Authorities are still working to identify the victims and notify their families before releasing the total number of fatalities. Investigators have not identified the suspect or released a possible motive for the shooting at this time. Spain's Immigration Crisis: Ceuta & The Collapse Of Sánchez's Pro-Migration Experiment

Ukraine Hits Russian Airbase, Refinery and Wildberries Warehouse

Ukrainian forces have launched a series of attacks on Russian targets including an airbase in Engels and a refinery in Saratov. A warehouse for online retailer Wildberries in Novosemeykino was also struck during the night of August 2. The attacks resulted in damage to infrastructure, loss of life, and fires in two of the locations. Ukrainian drones reportedly targeted these locations causing significant disruption to Russian operations. Key organizations such as Rosneft, the owner of the refinery, and Wildberries are affected by these strikes. The location of Engels and Saratov is significant as both are major cities in Russia's Samara region. The attack on Wildberries' warehouse has led to the closure of airspace over the Samara region. Russian Ministry of Defense claims to have intercepted 635 Ukrainian drones which were allegedly destroyed by their systems. This escalation marks a significant development in the ongoing conflict between Ukraine and Russia. The attack highlights the increasing use of drone technology in modern warfare strategies. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky confirmed that Ukraine was responsible for the strikes. The targets included key infrastructure and military facilities essential to Russian logistics. This development comes as US-led mediation efforts to end the war remain stalled. The conflict has been ongoing since February 2022 and continues to deepen militarization. Both sides are intensifying attacks on major cities, energy facilities, and warehouses.

Italian Navy Intercepts Russian 'Ghost Fleet' Tanker in Mediterranean

An Italian naval vessel intercepted and inspected a Russian petroler, Toa Payoh, in international waters near Pantelleria. The operation was part of an EU mission to monitor arms and oil trafficking in the Mediterranean. The Italian Navy's Thaon di Revel collaborated with a Greek warship and a Polish patrol aircraft. The vessel was found to be flying under the Camerounese flag despite being considered a ghost fleet of Russia. The EU mission has been monitoring Toa Payoh since it left the port of Cotonou in Benin on July 16. It is heading towards Istanbul and has been under surveillance for weeks. Italian authorities are analyzing the data and documents obtained during the inspection thoroughly. This operation matters because it highlights the EU's commitment to enforcing maritime law. 'Miracle Material' Extracts Water from Dry Air to Save European Islands

The European tourist industry is facing a severe water crisis and technology that can extract water from dry air may be the solution. Antroprenor Hashem Arouzi lost his fountains on his Ibiza property due to drought and is searching for a solution. He is looking for a solution not only for himself but for thousands of residents whose water sources are dwindling. The problem is exacerbated by excessive exploitation and flooding of freshwater sources into saltwater aquifers. A new technology developed by Ahbstra, a company founded by Arouzi, could provide a vital solution. A device can extract up to 500 liters of water per day from the air using molecular structures called MOF. The device is powered by ambient heat and energy making it a potential game-changer for communities. While there are concerns about its cost and efficiency, Ahbstra claims it can produce up to 1,000 liters per day. Key people involved include Hashem Arouzi, Richard Robson, Susumu Kitagawa, and Omar M. Yaghi. These scientists received the Nobel Prize in Chemistry for their work on MOF structures. The European region is particularly vulnerable to water scarcity due to climate change. Around 30% of residents face constant pressure on freshwater resources currently. This technology matters because it could

provide a reliable source of clean water for communities. Traditional methods are not effective in regions where droughts are becoming common.

Europeans Are About to Find Out How Entrenched AI Is in Their Daily Lives

The European Union's Artificial Intelligence Act will require all companies within its borders to label any content or interaction with an AI system starting on August 2. This includes ads, music recommendations, calendar management apps, and complaint hotlines that use AI. The goal of this regulation is to reduce deception and manipulation while helping people make informed choices. Companies that fail to comply will face fines ranging from €15 million to 3% of their worldwide annual turnover. Model developers, including those not typically associated with the technology, such as Spotify and Adobe, will also be subject to the new law. Critics warn that excessive labeling could lead to banner blindness and information overload for users. Proponents believe it will be a gamechanger for companies willing to adopt transparency in their operations. The regulation is similar in scope to the EU's General Data Protection Regulation which introduced cookie-consent pop-ups. The European Commission has allowed a transitional period for AI model providers to label synthetic content. However, enforcement deadlines have been delayed due to technical challenges in implementation. Compliance raises challenges for many digital service providers across the continent. This matters because it changes how consumers interact with digital services daily. Transparency is becoming a legal requirement rather than just an ethical choice. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has granted Zoox a temporary exemption from eight federal motor vehicle safety standards. As New York Finalizes New Social Media Rules, US Senate Considers Nationwide 'SCREEN' Act

New York has finalized new rules governing social media apps in the state which will take effect on January 25, 2027. The law restricts notifications sent to minors between midnight and 6 a.m. without parental consent. It also limits their exposure to curated feeds on these platforms significantly. In contrast, a U.S. Senate committee is considering the SCREEN ACT, an age-verification bill. This would require online services to verify users' ages before accessing sexually explicit content. The bill has sparked concerns about the impact on adult internet users as it would force them to reveal personal information. Sacrificing anonymity and security is a major worry for privacy advocates regarding this legislation. The SCREEN Act would also target virtual private network users potentially discouraging their use. Legitimate purposes such as protecting online privacy could be hindered by these restrictions. The law matters because it highlights the tension between regulating online content and protecting user rights. This is particularly true in regards to age verification and data security issues. Ariana Grande to take a break from public life amid 'endless' scrutiny

Prolonged drought could cause shortage of some foods, farmers' union head says

The UK has experienced an exceptionally dry and hot spell with low rainfall and prolonged heatwaves. This has led to depleted water reserves in soils, vegetation, and rivers across the country. At least 13 killed in Israeli strikes on Gaza after Hamas agree disarmament deal

The latest strikes on Gaza by Israeli military aircraft have resulted in at least 13 deaths including several children. The attacks occurred on three different locations: Gaza City, Khan Younis, and Deir el-Balah. According to Palestinian officials, the strikes targeted military operatives but also resulted in civilian casualties. Hamas accepted a disarmament plan days earlier which would see the group hand over its weapons. The plan involves US President Donald Trump's Board of Peace overseeing the process. The strikes are part of a second successive night of attacks on Gaza raising concerns. This tragedy highlights the ongoing humanitarian crisis in Gaza where over 1,100 Palestinians have been killed. This death toll is since a supposed ceasefire came into effect last October. The conflict continues to escalate despite diplomatic efforts to reach a disarmament agreement. Civilian safety remains a major concern for international observers monitoring the region.

Burnham pledges to be 'relentless' in curbing small boat crossings

Andy Burnham, the mayor of Greater Manchester and Labour Party leader, has pledged his government will be relentless in curbing small boat arrivals.
