DeepSeek's V4-Flash Model Undercuts US AI Pricing by 100x

The price of artificial intelligence has reached a new low with DeepSeek's V4-Flash model, which costs around three cents per benchmark test. This is significantly cheaper than other models such as Moonshot AI's Kimi K3 and OpenAI's GPT-5.6 Sol. The Chinese model's affordability makes it a contender in the market, with high scores on routine tasks such as summarization and boilerplate code. DeepSeek was recently backed by China's state-backed National AI Industry Investment Fund, allowing the company to access state-privileged capital. This has led some analysts to speculate that the Chinese government is involved in an industrial policy to capture global share in the AI market. The development of affordable AI models like V4-Flash raises questions about who is paying for these cheap inferences. The model's impact on the industry is also being felt, with companies like OpenAI and Google facing pressure to reduce their prices. Hugging Face CEO Clément Delangue believes China is winning the AI race due to its more open approach to

science and models. Delangue warns that if the US does not adopt an open-weight AI model approach, it may lose ground in the AI frontier. The US policymakers are currently debating whether to restrict open-weight AI models from China. Several tech companies, including Nvidia and Meta, have signed letters urging against restrictions on open-weight AI models. The emergence of affordable AI models like V4-Flash has significant implications for the future of the AI market. It particularly impacts global distribution and accessibility of advanced technology. Investors are watching closely to see how Western companies will respond to this pricing pressure. The situation highlights the intensifying economic competition between the US and China in the tech sector.

Trump Halts Iran Strikes as Oil Prices Fluctuate Amid Diplomatic Talks

US President Trump has announced a halt to strikes on Iran and hinted at a potential diplomatic breakthrough, causing Brent crude prices to fall and equities to rise. However, these gains are short-lived as markets expect renewed tensions later in the week. Iran's government denies any agreement with the US over the status of the Hormuz Strait, but talks between Iran and Oman are reportedly underway to discuss new shipping routes. Trump has also said Iran faces decapitation if it doesn't agree to a deal, while stating that Gulf allies halted planned US strikes in favor of diplomacy. Trump's comments come after he called off a planned massive attack on Iran at the request of Saudi Arabia, the UAE, and Qatar. 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Trump Urges Oil Majors to Lower Gas Prices Amid Election Concerns

Dacia and Ford Halt Production to Ease Romania's Energy Crisis

Romania has agreed to reduce its energy consumption by temporarily shutting down its car manufacturing plants, Dacia and Ford Otosan, in order to meet the country's energy demands during a severe energy crisis. The plants will stop production between 19:00 and 23:00, when energy demand peaks across the national grid. Premier Ilie Bolojan announced this measure as part of a voluntary reduction of energy consumption by companies with an annual energy consumption of over 50,000 megawatt-hours. Key players involved include the Romanian government, Dacia and Ford Otosan, as well as several other car manufacturers in Romania. The plants are expected to save around 200 MW of energy during the peak hours each day. This move matters because it shows that car manufacturers are willing to take measures to reduce their energy consumption during a severe crisis. Additionally, August is typically a month when the automotive industry takes a break and performs maintenance work, making this timing particularly strategic for the government's efforts. Kronospan, one of Romania's largest consumers of electricity, has also voluntarily agreed to reduce its energy consumption by up to 50%. This decision comes after approximately 80 major industrial consumers were convened to identify measures to reduce consumption during peak periods. The company took this step as a responsible response to operator requests to contribute to balancing the system. The move also demonstrates Kronospan's commitment to sustainable operations and cooperation with authorities. These measures highlight the need for all major consumers to take responsibility for reducing energy consumption during peak periods. The country faces risks of stopping a nuclear power plant if consumption is not managed effectively.

Romanian Competition Council Fines Agrana and Lucsor €10 Million for Sugar Price-Fixing

The Romanian Competition Council has fined two companies, Agrana and Lucsor Impex, for price-fixing in the sugar market totaling approximately 10 million euros. Agrana, an Austrian company with factories in Romania, was fined 42.18 million lei, while Lucsor Impex, a Romanian firm controlled by the Bănică family, was fined 9.91 million lei. The total fines amount to 52 million lei aimed at preventing price-fixing and ensuring fair prices for sugar in Romania. Key players involved include Agrana, a leading Austrian sugar producer, and Lucsor Impex, a Romanian firm with significant market presence. The investigation was conducted by the Romanian Competition Council following complaints about rising sugar costs. Why it matters is that this case highlights the importance of enforcing competition laws to prevent price-fixing and maintain fair market practices in Romania's sugar industry. The companies were investigated in 2023 after sugar prices increased by 60% in a single year. This significant price hike prompted regulatory scrutiny into the behaviors of major market players. The decision aims to restore consumer confidence in the pricing mechanisms of essential goods. It also serves as a warning to other companies operating within the Romanian food sector. The fines reflect the severity of the infraction and the impact on local consumers. Enforcement of competition laws is crucial for maintaining a healthy economic environment. Traffic Fine License Suspension Law Suspended by Court Appeal

A recent court decision allowing traffic fines to be paid over time in Romania has been suspended, temporarily halting its application across the country. The suspension was granted by the Court of Appeal București, which stayed the

implementation of the law due to PSD's appeals against the measure. Key people involved are the Romanian government and PSD party leaders, who had filed objections and appealed against the decision. Organizations like the Ministry of Finance and Ministry of Internal Affairs were also affected by the suspension of the new regulations. The measure originally allowed drivers to pay traffic fines over time, with a 90-day deadline for payment before suspension of their driving license. If the fine is not paid within this timeframe, the driver will face one day of license suspension for every 50 Lei owed. The court's decision was made after PSD filed objections against the law, and the government has now announced its intention to appeal the ruling. Until a new decision or resolution is reached, the suspension remains in place for all drivers. This leaves drivers without automatic license revocation if fines are not paid on time during this interim period. The legal battle highlights the ongoing tension between the government and opposition parties regarding traffic enforcement. It also raises questions about the stability of legislative changes in the current political climate. Drivers are advised to stay informed about the status of the law as the appeal process continues. The outcome will determine future enforcement strategies for traffic violations in Romania.

Reddit CEO Criticizes Google AI Overviews for Lack of Human Context

Reddit CEO Steve Huffman has criticized Google's AI Overviews for failing to deliver traffic benefits, arguing that users value human perspectives and firsthand experiences. Huffman believes that AI compression of content has led to a lack of context and personal opinions online, resulting in consumer skepticism. He stated that Reddit provides the opposite: deep discussions, debates, and lived experiences that users seek. The criticism was made in a letter to investors, where Huffman highlighted the importance of finding context, personal opinion, and first-hand accounts amidst the proliferation of AI tools. Key people involved are Steve Huffman, CEO of Reddit, and Google, which offers AI Overviews to search users. The criticism matters because it highlights the shift in user preferences towards human perspectives over automated content summaries. It also suggests that traditional search methods may not be as effective in driving growth for content platforms. As a result, Reddit's shares fell 20% due to concerns about unstable Google referrals undermining its growth. The debate underscores the tension between search giants and content creators in the AI era. Users are increasingly skeptical of AI-generated summaries that lack nuance. Samsung Bans Smart TV Apps Sharing User Internet Connections with Strangers

Several popular Samsung smart TV apps contain code that share the owner's internet connection with strangers, potentially putting millions of Samsung smart TVs at risk of hijacking. The security research, conducted by Norwegian cybersecurity company Mnemonic, found that some of these apps have been installed on hundreds of millions of smart TVs worldwide. Key people involved include Harrison Sand, an offensive security consultant at Mnemonic, and Bright

Data, an Israel-based company providing proxy networks. The companies' actions matter because they highlight the risks of low-quality apps proliferating across Samsung's app store. These apps use residential proxy networks to funnel outsiders' web traffic through users' home and office connections. This allows hackers to tap into users' internet connections even when the app is not open. Norwegian cybersecurity company Mnemonic has warned that this poses a significant risk to users. The research highlights a flaw in Samsung's app store, which allows low-quality apps to proliferate with minimal scrutiny. Samsung has promised to ban apps with similar functionality and remove them from its store. However, some apps were found to be endorsed by the electronics giant, including a simple Pac-Man game. This incident raises concerns about the security of smart TVs and their impact on users' online privacy. The issue is particularly concerning given the widespread use of smart TVs in homes globally. Users are advised to check their installed apps and update their firmware immediately. Samsung's response will be critical in restoring consumer trust in its ecosystem.

Apple Challenges UK Government Demand for iCloud Encryption Backdoor

Apple has filed a complaint with the UK's Investigatory Powers Tribunal against a secret government legal order, known as a technical capability notice. US Company's AI Lets Ukraine's Cheap Kamikaze Drones Track Targets

California-based company Perennial Autonomy has developed cost-effective AI-powered capabilities for battlefield drones, specifically targeting Ukrainian military's short-range FPV drones. The innovation involves integrating a flight control system and terminal guidance system optimized to run on Western-made Arm system-on-a-chip. This technology enables the Shrike drones equipped with it to operate autonomously, costing about \$2,000 each compared to traditional manual-piloted Ukrainian drones at \$400. The Auterion team based in Munich, Germany, has fulfilled a \$100 million contract for 50,000 drones funded by an unnamed European country. This development is significant as it reduces the cost of drone procurement and deployment, making them more accessible to Western militaries. The technology also offers improved autonomy and precision, potentially reducing civilian casualties in conflict zones. The project matters as it highlights the increasing use of AI in military applications and the potential for cost savings. It also raises questions about

the proliferation of autonomous drones on the battlefield internationally. The integration of AI allows drones to track targets on their own without constant human input. This shift could change the dynamics of modern warfare significantly. Western militaries are increasingly adopting these technologies to maintain strategic advantages. EU AI Act Transparency Rules Enter Force Requiring Content Labeling

The European Union has implemented new transparency obligations under its landmark AI Act, requiring companies to disclose when interacting with AI models online. The rules came into effect on August 2nd and require providers to notify users that they are dealing with an AI instead of a human. Deployers such as platforms and services must also label AI-generated or manipulated content clearly for users. This move aims to help individuals make informed decisions about the authenticity of online interactions and content. Key organizations involved include Meta, SpaceXAI, and Facebook, which have already adopted similar disclosure labels voluntarily. The EU's transparency guidelines note that people should be able to distinguish between AI and human-created content. This will prevent misinformation and deception from spreading unchecked across digital platforms. Companies that fail to comply risk fines of up to €15 million or 3% of their global annual turnover. The new rules apply immediately to new AI systems, with a four-month grace period for existing models until December 2nd. This move matters as it addresses growing concerns about the misuse of AI-generated content and deepfakes online. It sets a global benchmark for AI regulation and transparency standards. Other jurisdictions are watching closely to see how enforcement plays out in Europe. The rules aim to increase trust in AI systems among the general public. Compliance will require significant adjustments for many tech companies operating in the EU. The implementation marks a major step in governing artificial intelligence responsibly.

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AI Music App Treblo Identifies Potential AI Generation in Summer Hit Song

The current debate surrounding Fenix Flexin's song Rubberz has taken a surprising turn with the revelation that the song may have been partially AI-generated. The song, a synth-pop tune, has been accused of using AI music detectors and sparked controversy over its unusual genre shift and voice. The creators of Treblo, a lesser-known generative AI music app, have claimed to have figured out how Fenix used the app to create the track. Medasin produced a video detailing his

accusation methodically regarding the use of the app. According to Medasin, Fenix had previously used Sonauto, but switched to Treblo before releasing Rubberz. This new information has prompted the creators of Treblo to flag both Fenix's and Tyga's songs as likely AI-generated. Fenix Flexin's labelmate Tyga is also under scrutiny for allegedly using the same app to create his own 80s-themed tunes. The controversy highlights concerns over the increasing use of AI in music creation across the industry. The implications of this discovery remain unclear and will likely continue to spark debate among fans. Music media are now questioning the authenticity of chart-topping hits more rigorously. Artists may face pressure to disclose their use of AI tools in production. The incident underscores the need for clearer labeling standards in the music industry. Ukrainian Drone Strike Kills Seven on Busy Russian Beach

A drone crashed onto a beach in southern Russia, killing seven people including three children and injuring 40 others. The incident occurred on the Black Sea near the village of Arkhipo-Osipovka, which is a popular tourist destination for Russians. Russian authorities have accused Ukraine of a deliberate strike on civilians, but both sides deny targeting civilians deliberately. Governor Veniamin Kondratyev stated that 17 people were hospitalized due to injuries from the crash. The drone's target is still unclear, with some Ukrainian Telegram channels suggesting it may have been jammed by electronic warfare. July 2026 Recorded as Driest Month Ever in England and Wales

July 2026 was the driest month ever recorded in the UK, with extremely low rainfall and high temperatures across the region. The Met Office reported that England and Wales experienced record-low precipitation levels, with only 6.5ml of rain falling in England and 9.3ml in Wales. This was also the warmest July on record for both countries simultaneously. The drought had a significant impact on the UK's weather patterns, with four months already exceeding average precipitation levels. Amy Doherty, a scientist at Met Office, noted that the combination of drought and heat led to one of the most extreme months in UK history. The UK Health Security Agency also reported that the heatwaves caused 2,877 additional deaths in England. This highlights the severe consequences of the extreme weather on public health. Other locations affected by the heatwave include Scotland and Northern Ireland to a lesser extent. The findings matter because they highlight the devastating impact of climate change on the UK's weather patterns. The UK is expected to experience a heatwave in August, with parts of England potentially meeting official heatwave conditions. EU Calls for Stronger Borders Following Ceuta Migrant Crossing Crisis

The main event is the chaotic influx of tens of thousands of migrants from Morocco into the Spanish exclave of Ceuta last week. This resulted in an official death toll of 72 on the Spanish side during the crossing attempts. European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen has called for united action to address border security concerns. She praised Spanish Prime Minister Pedro Sánchez' handling of the crisis during emergency talks. The migrant influx has strained relations among EU member states significantly. Italy and Finland backed a temporary suspension of Spain's Schengen membership in response to Ceuta crossings. Czech Prime Minister Andrej Babiš had urged a similar move, but Sanchez denied this would be taken due to Ceuta being outside the Schengen area. The crisis has also led to criticism from some EU governments regarding border management. Von der Leyen urged stronger border security measures at critical points to prevent future occurrences. Emergency talks among EU interior ministers are scheduled for Tuesday to discuss

Child Vaccination Rates Drop in UK Due to Reduced Medical Interactions

The number of child deaths in Europe has decreased dramatically, from 40-50% before the 1800s to less than 1% today. Vaccines are widely credited with this improvement, along with clean water and sanitation improvements. However, recent measles outbreaks in Britain, including two child deaths, have raised concerns about a decline in immunisation rates. The UK's Health Committee has described this trend as a national disgrace requiring immediate attention. Scientists point to social media misinformation as a contributing factor to the hesitation. But they also note that parents' reduced face-to-face interactions with medical professionals may be a more significant reason for the drop. Experts suggest that anti-vax sentiment on social media is not the sole cause of the decline in immunisation rates. The UN reports that Britain's rates are now among the lowest in Europe currently. This development matters because it undermines decades of progress in reducing child mortality. It potentially puts public health at risk of preventable diseases spreading.
