Executive Summary

- **Romanian Political Crisis:** Designated Prime Minister Adrian Veștea faces exclusion from the PNL party as government formation negotiations stall amidst conflicting party mandates.
- **Tech & AI Shifts:** SpaceX acquires AI coding tool Cursor for €52 billion, while Snap debuts high-priced AR glasses; Microsoft abandons a \$3B Oracle deal over security compliance.

Romania

PM Nominee Veștea Excluded from PNL Amidst Government Formation Crisis Adrian Veștea, the designated Prime Minister, has been excluded from the National Liberal Party (PNL) for attempting to form a government without party approval, while UDMR announced it will not join the proposed cabinet. Veștea confirmed secret meetings with President Nicușor Dan, who encouraged him to continue efforts despite the political instability and opposition from coalition partners. SpaceX Acquires AI Coding Tool Cursor in €52 Billion Deal SpaceX has agreed to acquire Anysphere, the developer of the popular AI-powered coding tool Cursor, in an all-stock deal worth approximately €52 billion to expand its presence in the AI software industry. This strategic move positions SpaceX to compete directly with OpenAI and Anthropic, potentially boosting its valuation significantly beyond its traditional space technology focus. Mobileye to Launch Standalone Robotaxi Service in US by 2027 Mobileye plans to enter the US robotaxi market with a vertically integrated service, initially deploying 100 vehicles with plans to scale to 17,000 within five years through partnerships with Volkswagen and Lyft. The service will utilize Mobileye's "SuperVision" ADAS technology, marking a significant expansion for the Intel-owned company into autonomous mobility operations. Mistral AI Fails Test for Detecting Russian Propaganda A study by the Estonian Institute for Language and Culture found that Mistral AI models scored below 40% in detecting propaganda, often directing users to sources like Russia Today and Sputnik. Anthropic Models Offline Due to Trump Administration Dispute Anthropic's AI models were taken offline following a decision by the White House linked to a dispute over the involvement of cybersecurity expert Katie Moussouris in a jailbreak review.
